## What is the Library of Congress?

The Library of Congress is the research library that officially serves the United States Congress, and is the de facto national library of the United States. It is the oldest federal cultural institution in the United States. The Library

is housed in three buildings on Capitol Hill in Washington, D.C.

In September, Dr. Carla Hayden was sworn in as the new director of the library. She is the first African-American, and the first woman to lead the
